SKYWARN® training April 24th!

The **Thunder Bay Amateur Radio Club** is helping to promote SKYWARN®, the volunteer program of storm spotters that relay real-time weather information to the National Weather Service. Spring Spotter Training will be held in Alpena at **Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary, 500 West Fletcher Avenue, starting at 6:30 PM, on April 24th.** This training is open to anyone and there is no cost to attend or participate as a spotter.

The National Weather Service relies on spotter reports to track severe weather events and help in making more accurate forecasts and warnings. Trained weather spotters are the National Weather Services' "eyes on the ground" and provide needed weather observations.

The Thunder Bay Amateur Radio Club has donated two weather alert radios for door prizes to be given away at the end of the training for those attending. They will have literature about Amateur Radio available, and local area Amateur Radio operators will be there to answer questions you may have about Amateur Radio.
